### Childhood Attachment Disruption/Disorder: A Symptom Checklist

The Child Attachment Checklist contains 28 items; 16 of the items came from a checklist developed and used by Evergreen Consultants. Twelve additional items were developed by Dr. Buenning and added to the original 16 to produce the 28-item Child Attachment Checklist. The checklist is appropriate for 5 years of age and older, including teenagers.

### Reactive Attachment Disorder Treatment, RAD

Reactive Attachment DisorderChecklist (RAD-C): The RAD-C (Hall, 2007) was developed for the study based on the DSM-IV criteria to be completed by the current primary caregiver. The RAD-C is composed of 17 questions regarding the child's/adolescent's typical behavior.

If, in addition to several items being marked, any of the last three items is check, your child may be experiencing attachment related problems. This checklist is not a tool to use to make a clinical diagnosis of Reactive Attachment Disorder, Complex Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, or any other mental health disorder.

### Observations Checklist: what to look for in assessing ...

Reactive attachment disorder is a condition in which your child is unable to establish healthy attachment with you, their parent or primary caretaker. This can lead to difficulty connecting with others and managing their emotions, resulting in a lack of trust and self-worth, a fear of getting close to anyone, anger, and a need to be in control.

Reactive attachment disorder is a rare but serious condition in which an infant or young child doesn't establish healthy attachments with parents or caregivers. Reactive attachment disorder may develop if the child's basic needs for comfort, affection and nurturing aren't met and loving, caring, stable attachments with others are not established.

### Reactive attachment disorder - Symptoms and causes - Mayo ...

Reactive attachment disorder (RAD) is a trauma disorder that occurs in infancy or very young childhood; however, the effects of reactive attachment disorder are long-lasting and can be seen in children and teens (Reactive Attachment Disorder in Adults).Reactive attachment disorder is caused by neglect so severe that an infant doesn't form an attachment to a caregiver.

### Effects of Reactive Attachment Disorder in Teens, Children ...

The term 'Reactive Attachment Disorder' is a psychiatric diagnosis defined by criteria in the DSM-IV (APA, 1994). (2.5 times average), drug abuse (3.8 times average), and antisocial behavior (4.3 times average) (MacMillian, 2001). The effective treatment of such children is a public health concern (Walker, Goodwin, & Warren, 1992).

### Treatment for Children with Reactive Attachment Disorder ...

Attachment Disorder In the media, in court cases, on the Internet, and in child welfare agencies, there is much confusion about Reactive Attachment Disorder (RAD) and Attachment Disorder (AD), an unrecognized, fad diagnosis that often poses as RAD.
